Community Nature Center Open Space Preserve

Purchased by the City of Prescott in 2007, the original concept of the Community Nature Center remains in tact for future generations. This 18-acre site preserves the unique character of the Prescott area's natural heritage.

As a transitional zone between the Sonoran Desert region to the south, and the Colorado Plateau to the north, this zone draws plant and animal species from both regions, making it distinct and diverse.

Established by the Prescott Unified School District (PUSD) in the 1970s, the Center was managed for many years by the Highlands Center for Natural History. A small group of volunteers assist with interpretation of the natural values, maintenance, and monitoring of the site.

With 1.5 miles of trails, visitors experience a microcosm of the area when roaming through the grasslands and boulders. Activities include hiking, birding, and nature study. Prescott's history is represented with the Hardyville Road exhibit along the trail, as well as the Native American teepee, and log cabin constructed by the Youth Conservation Corps in 1976.

Guides are available at the Center's kiosk or on the Community Nature Center page online at: www.cityofprescott.net/services/parks/parks. The Center is open year-round from 7:00 a.m. until sunset. Parking is free.

The Parks - Ken Lindley Park

Part of a larger 4.6 acre complex that includes the historic Ken Lindley Stadium and Ball Field, Mike Fann Community Skate Park, and tennis courts, Ken Lindley park is a neighborhood park with everything you might expect.

Nestled in the northwest corner of the complex, it sports a large ramada with picnic table and barbeque, which is available for rent and ideal for celebrations with family and friends. Activities for children include a playground and the skate park (which is located just across the parking lot).

One of Prescott's older parks, the facilities in this charming park were recently painted, making it ready for the 2014 season and visitors.

Born in Parker, Arizona on May 15, 1925, Ken Lindley moved to the Prescott area at the age of 16 and attended Mayer High School. After serving in the U.S. Navy during World War II, he worked as an automobile mechanic. In October 1951 he joined the Prescott Police Department. Working his way up through the ranks, he was named Chief of Police on March 15, 1961, and was considered throughout Arizona as one of the best in his profession.

On September 10, 1971, Chief Lindley was killed in an automobile accident while en route to Cottonwood Airport on a narcotics investigation, with two Arizona Department of Public Safety Officers. Chief Lindley was dead upon arrival at the hospital. The other two officers and the seven people in the other car were all injured. He served with the Prescott Police Department one month shy of 20 years.

Very active, well known and liked in the community, he had a passion for sports and kids, especially baseball and softball. Summer evenings and weekends, Chief Lindley became a fixture at "City Field" as a spectator, coach and player. He coached and managed youth baseball in Prescott from the 1950s until his death, sometimes coaching with his friend Bill Valley. He also pitched on a slo-pitch softball team, and participated in a tournament in St. Louis just days before the accident.

Shortly after his death, Mayor Taylor T. Hicks, Sr. and the Prescott City Council unanimously passed a resolution renaming City Park to Ken Lindley Field. A 1930s WPA (Works Progress Administration) facility, the stadium was placed on the National Register of Historic places in 1994. (Contributor Nancy Nesbit)

The Lakes - Watson Lake

In Memory of our Fallen Heroes; Watson Lake Park Playground

June 30th of this year will commemorate the one year anniversary of the Yarnell Fire and the loss of Prescott's 19 Granite Mountain Hotshot firefighters.

In December 2013, ExerPlay and Landscape Structures generously donated a playground, adjacent to the existing playground, in their memory. Designed for children ages 2-5, it is modeled after a fire truck and lists the names of all the fallen Granite Mountain Hotshots. Local firefighters, staff from ExerPlay and Prescott Recreation Services staff assisted in the construction of the playground. Both playground areas were covered with Fibar, an engineered wood chip product which cushions falls. Hanson Aggregate provided cement for the project and Lowes Home Improvement provided most of the border surrounding the play surface. The city also installed a new drinking Fountain with donations from B&W Fire Security Systems, Superior Roofing of Northern Arizona, and Yavapai Plumbing and Heating.

"This is a tremendous upgrade to Watson Lake Park for future generations to enjoy and pay Homage to our fallen Granite Mountain Hotshots", said Tim Legler, Prescott Recreation Services Superintendent.

2013 Trail Counts

In 2013, Prescott city trails saw an increase in traffic of approximately 10 percent over 2012.


Of the 26 city trails, counters were installed at 11 sites. This was a significant expansion from the three sites which were covered in 2012; Constellation, Flume, and Peavine.

To check the accuracy of the counters, volunteers were periodically placed at several sites to compare results, which confirmed the data of the counters.

Logs completed at many trailheads indicate that visitors from outside areas have increased. Although the trail system has expanded, traffic on old trails has not diminished and is also increasing.

Expansion of city trails continues to make Prescott a destination for the outdoor recreationist. Prescott is notable for its weather, history, and now outdoor recreation opportunities, which will continue to grow and draw visitors well into the future.

What our Visitors Have To Say

A number of visitors have taken the time to tell us about their experience by filling out the log books located at many trailheads. The records from 2013 found that they have come from 43 of the 50 states, including Alaska and Hawaii. 21 foreign countries have been represented and included visitors from Canada, Mexico, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, the Czech Republic, Denmark, England, France, Germany, Holland, India, Indonesia, Israel, Lebanon, the Netherlands, Philippines, Singapore, Switzerland, Syria, and Turkey.

Because only a small percentage of trail users fill out the logs, it is conceivable that visitors from other countries and states may have also enjoyed City parks and trails.

The comments have been overwhelmingly positive and the remarks indicate an appreciation of the beauty of Prescott. Many noted how well maintained and marked the trails are. The wilderness feel of urban trails was also noted.

Many plan on returning, have returned, or have recently moved to Prescott, indicating that the Mile High Trail System is appreciated and important to all our visitors.

City of Prescott Hosts a Multitude of Sporting Events/Tournaments

The City of Prescott Recreation Services Department provides many sports related activities for our residents and surrounding communities of all ages. We also host many sporting events and tournaments that boost our local economy throughout the year. Some of the events include, mountain biking, running events, softball and baseball tournaments, Senior Olympics, Tiny-Tot Olympics, youth football and soccer.

Our calendar of sporting events begins in mid March with the Go! Off Road Duathlon and commences just before Thanksgiving with the NJCAA National Soccer Championship. The annual Amateur Softball Association Beat the Heat and Best of the West Softball tournaments in June and July bring an estimated \$280,000 to our local economy. With over 8,200 athletes competing in approximately 30 events from March to November, the local economy sees an estimated \$1.5 million increase in business sales at local shops, hotels and restaurants.

The Recreation Services Department has a tremendous staff that work extremely hard to ensure each event and tournament listed on our calendar is conducted with the best service possible that includes our Parks staff managing care of the fields and facilities, Recreation staff working with each event coordinator and tournament director, and of course the highest level of customer service for the athletes and family members who come and play in our City.

The Recreation Services Department takes extreme pride in the calendar of sporting events and continues to search for new events and tournaments each year. Whether you are one of our athletes competing or you just want to experience any of these events or tournaments, the 2014 calendar of sporting events has many opportunities for you! *(See page 12 for this year's calendar.)*






Spotlight On Dave Hatfield

Our History

Evolution of the Department; Part Two



The 1990s brought many exciting additions to the Department's portfolio through citizen and staff-led efforts. These included the City-County joint development of the Pioneer Park sports complex through a lease on federal land, and funding from State Heritage Fund grants (i.e., monies from the AZ Lottery). At the same time, the City secured Federal funding to purchase portions of the former Santa Fe Railroad grade, for conversion to a recreation trail, and the Mile-High Trail System was born. Also in the 1990s, the City contributed \$1 million towards the new YMCA to better serve area youth, and Acker Park on Virginia Street was created. In 1998, through a voter-approved referendum, the City purchased Willow and Watson Lakes (i.e.,

water rights and land base) from Chino Valley Irrigation District for \$15 million.

Since 2000, the Department has diversified its portfolio with many partners with the expansion of the High Trail System; opening the Mike Fann Community Skate Park, Willow Creek Dog Park, and Mile-Watson Lake Horseshoe Complex; expanded water-based amenities at Willow & Watson Lakes; purchase of high quality lands in the Granite Dells; purchasing and opening the Community Nature Center; and developing the Rowle P. Simmons Community Center and Granite Creek pump track. Other highlights since 2000 have included a successful Special Needs Activity Program and sports leagues, hosting AZ Cardinals training camps and a U.S. Women's Olympic Softball Exhibition, and hosting numerous large softball tournaments and special events. A Council-adopted master plan effort in 2007 defined future directions for the Department's portfolio, contingent on available funding and grants. The 2007 master plan also allowed comparing Prescott with other communities and National Standards for Parks and Recreation facilities.

In 2008, Debbie Horton became Director and began implementation of the master plan, and coordinated the City's hosting of the U.S. Women's Softball Olympic Exhibition (i.e., their last game before leaving for the Summer Games in Beijing) for a record crowd at Ken Lindley Stadium. Debbie also streamlined many operations, and successfully guided the Department following some difficult budgetary years due to the recession.

In 2011, Joe Baynes joined the Department as Assistant Director, and ultimately Director later that year and today provides the continued leadership for providing high quality settings and services, with considerably fewer staff. Outstanding volunteers, donors, partners, and City Council support have helped make this possible. We look forward to a bright future in serving residents and visitors.

Construction Continues on the 50-Mile Prescott Circle Trail

In February, trail construction began on City-owned land that is part of a major section of the Prescott Circle Trail (PCT) that ultimately connects the Watson Lake area, to Government Canyon area, and Prescott National Forest and beyond. One and a quarter miles was finished over the old landfill site as of February 23, 2014 with an additional seven-tenths of a mile from the Peavine parking area south along the old railroad grade to the start of the newly constructed trail, all on city land.


Continuing eastbound, trail construction will continue on land owned by Yavapai County, before reaching the Arizona State Trust Lands southeast of the juvenile justice center. In mid-February, the City received the official right-of-entry to construct the PCT within leased rights-of-way. The 1% sales tax for streets and open space made funding this lease possible. Since State Trust Lands are not public lands, a detailed process was completed that opened the door for 6.6 miles of trail construction. This also includes a section of the PCT near Pioneer Parkway and Williamson Valley Road. Funding for construction of the trail is being made possible via a trails grant secured by International Mountain Bike Association through Arizona State Parks. Labor sources will include contracted trail crews, The Over the Hill Gang, Yavapai Trails Association (i.e., the original visionary for the PCT), and various community restitution crews through City of Prescott and Yavapai County. This total effort is one

of the largest trail construction projects ever undertaken by the City of Prescott, will compliment the efforts by Prescott National Forest, and will result in a completed long-distance trail for many to enjoy.

Arizona Diamondbacks Foundation Building a New Little-League Baseball Field at Kuebler Field

Since 2000 the Arizona Diamondbacks Foundation, Inc., (ADF), has built or refurbished over 32 baseball fields under their "Diamonds Back" Youth Field Building Program. The fields are built through the aid of corporate sponsor APS, local businesses, and funds from the Arizona Diamondbacks Foundation, and monetary donations from players. Fields generally feature new lights, an electronic scoreboard, new fencing and backstops, new irrigation, and new dirt work and/or grass. The sites of the fields are determined through a grant process.

During summer 2013, the ADF informed Prescott Little League that Prescott had been selected as the preferred location to construct a baseball field as part of their grant program. With plans already available for the baseball field portion of the larger multi-use field expansion contemplated at Pioneer Park, Kuebler Field was identified as the logical site for construction, and after a tour of the location, ADF representatives agreed. ADF will provide the final design, construction, management, and funding. Pimmex General Contracting and Nelson Architects have agreed to donate their services to ADF, with a goal of completion by June 2014. The project includes grading and installation of irrigation, sod, ball field lighting, a scoreboard, fencing, bleachers, and dugouts.



Because the City-County boundary for leased Bureau of Land Management property bisects the project location, both Prescott City Council and Yavapai County Board of Supervisors approved the project. The Little League ball field will be designed and constructed field will be designed and constructed to allow further expansion consistent with the originally-proposed multi-use fields. The future expansion will allow one (1) regulation size soccer field and one (1) junior size soccer field that can also be used for youth football, as well as, additional parking facilities.

Something New - Goldwater Lake Expansion Now Open



The City of Prescott opened the new Goldwater Lake day use area to the public on Saturday March 15th, 2014, and close to 100 people came to support the grand opening. The new day use areas include a new playground, two new ramadas, two new restrooms, a ceremony pad, many individual picnic sites, new trails, and an additional 105 parking spaces. Also, with the drilling of the new well, the park has its first public/potable water system as water previously needed to be transported to the park. The expansion has received much support from Prescott City Council.

Project Manager Eric Smith worked closely with Kelley-Wise Engineering and Fann Contracting to help make the expansion a reality. Speaking and supporting the grand opening and dedication of the new day use areas were Mayor Marlin Kuykendall and Councilmen Steve Blair and Charlie Arnold. Elisabeth Ruffner, a local historian gave a brief and informative history of the Goldwater Lake area. The grandson of the late Senator Barry

Goldwater, Michael Goldwater Jr., also spoke at the grand opening of his childhood memories at Goldwater Lake and fishing for bluegill. He spoke of his Great Uncle, Morris Goldwater, and how he was instrumental in damming up Banning Creek, which created Goldwater Lake, when the City was searching for a new water source after the fire in the early 1900s.

The expansion of Goldwater Lake was made possible by impact fees from new housing building permits, and it took about four months to complete the project. The expansion of Goldwater Lake could not have been a success without the help of the Recreation Services staff, the Over-the-Hill-Gang trail volunteers, the City Community Restitution Program, and the Yavapai County Adult Probation Program. This expansion is the first major update to Goldwater Lake since it opened in 1979.

This year the City of Prescott is experiencing a significant increase in graffiti with 661 tags in January and February. Graffiti removal is important in keeping our city beautiful, discouraging bad behavior and deterring crime. Each tag costs \$25.00 to clean up. In 2013, 240 hours were spent removing 1,477 tags at a cost to the City of approximately \$36,925. This cost does not take into account the time involved to locate and document tags by the police department, Park Rangers, and Citizens on Patrol, or the replacement of signs by various city departments. Spotlight On ... Chris Hosking

A native of Windermere in the Lake District of Northern England, Chris move to the United States in 1989. An Industrial Design Consultant, he worked in Silicon Valley for Apple computers and other industries. An outdoorsman, he found it difficult sitting inside at a desk. He decided to change course and moved to Mammoth Lakes in California's High Sierras. He did some freelance design consulting and opened his own business bringing bicycle products to market. Chris also diversified and managed a YMCA camp and was a snowmobile guide.

Tired of the severe winter weather of the Sierras, Chris and his young family moved to Prescott in August 2006. Weather, outdoor recreation activities, and quality of life were the defining factors in making the decision to move to Prescott.

Chris became the Prescott Parks and Recreation Department Trails Specialist, succeeding Eric Smith who had developed many miles of City trails, including the Peavine National Recreation Trail. Expanding on Eric's efforts, Chris reorganized the Over the Hill Gang and made plans to build trails in the Dells and around both Watson and Willow Lakes, adding 25 miles to the now 54 mile city trail system. He also planned and built trails in smaller parks and natural parklands, which are designed to give the visitor the feel of being in a remote area. To keep maintenance at a minimum, trails have

a rolling contour design which sheds water and low speed features to accommodate multi-use. A spokesman for the City of Prescott's trail system, he is involved in organizations and projects designed to expand the Prescott area trails system well into the future.

Chris and his wife of 24 years, Lisa, have two children, Jake 18 and Hannah 14. He participates in just about all outdoor sports, but especially mountain biking, hiking, off-road motor sports, sailing, and camping. Chris believes that Prescott's trails and outdoor recreation will be one of the things that will define Prescott in the future. When talking about the trails he states, "It's about the journey and not always about the destination."
