

Supervision

- Maintained Joint Partnerships with USFS and CYFD.
- Continued participation and development of Statewide Mutual Aid Program.
- Continued Partnership with the Yavapai Prescott Indian Tribe.
- Participated in the Governor's Forest Health oversight Council with 31 recommendations forwarded to the State Legislature for actions.
- Completed Communications Center.
- Secured land and began architectural process for new downtown fire station.

Suppression

- Personnel and equipment responded to 7661 emergency calls for service.
- Purchased one Type I Engine.
- Specified and ordered Type I truck company.
- Awarded 2 Medals of Gallantry, 4 Medals of Courage for rescues during fire suppression.
- Deputy Chief retires after 31 years of service.
- Promoted new Deputy Chief, new Battalion Chief, new Captain, new Engineer, 2 new Firefighters.
- Serviced 2574 hydrants.


Training

- Conducted 25,584 man-hours of in-service training.
- Conducted proficiency testing of all personnel with 100% passing.
- Received specialized training in: Incident Command, Arizona Public Service, Evaluations, Supervision instruction, Infectious control, Application Data Systems Incorporated, Wildland fire training, Arizona State Fire School.
- Conducted 8 monthly multi company training drills.
- Conducted 2 months of live fire training.
- Conducted 3 Arizona State fire marshal classes, 3 fire science related courses.
- Coordinated the Arizona Wildland Fire Academy.
- All personnel participated in National Stand Down for Safety.
- Conducted 4 promotional examinations.
- Developed quarterly training packets.
- Coordinated firefighter 1-2 academy thru Yavapai College.
- Conducted 4 Multi company disaster drills.
- Performed multiple multi-agency drills and classes.
- Updated, organized and cumulated all training records.

Prevention

- Reviewed 1,479 plans for new subdivisions and buildings.
- Trained 2800 students in fire/life safety via new and improved school program.
- Received and cleared 40 life safety complaints.
- Conducted 2187 fire inspections.
- Conducted 17 fire investigations.
- Received \$1700 in grant monies for public education and child safety seats.
- In process of adopting 2006 International Fire Code and Wildland Urban Interface Code.

Hazardous Materials Response Team

- Conducted eleven monthly combination engine company drills and classes.
- Assisted other out of jurisdiction teams with several incidents.
- Maintained a position on the Yavapai County Local Emergency Planning Committee.
- Ordered updated equipment.
- Completed Hazardous Materials pre-plans.

Technical Rescue

- Conducted eleven monthly technical rescue classes in all disciplined areas.
- Member of the Yavapai County Local Emergency Planning Committee.
- Conducted 6 team training drills.
- Trained 60 city personnel in trench rescue awareness level.
- Received 6 people as FEMA certified technical rescue technicians.
- Secured \$8000.00 for technical rescue equipment.

Wildland

- Continued the hazardous tree removal program with Yavapai County, successfully removing 102 hazard trees.
- Assessed 393 homes for wildland fire risk. 313 residential building plans reviewed.
- Conducted fuels treatment on 147 homes reducing the wildland fire threat.
- Granite Mountain crew worked 78 days on fires locally and throughout the Western United States..
- Completed 27 acres of fuel break construction. 20 acres completed on tribal lands.
- 500 tons of materials to Yavapai County from fuels management and 3950 tons to City transfer station.
- Personnel and equipment were dispatched to California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico as part of our agreement with the United States Forest Service.
