



PICTURE OF THE NEW COURT HOUSE.—  
H. G. Howe, Esq., **Architect**, with Campbell & Parker, has an elaborate drawing of the new Court House on the Plaza, as it will appear from a second story window of Campbell & Parker's establishment, at the S. E. corner of the Plaza, or N. E. corner of Cortez and Goodwin streets. The building, as shown in the picture, is complete, in every particular, except a few shadings and touches, that are yet to be added, to bring out distances, etc., and represents it just as it will appear when finished according to the contract and the plans and specifications on file, including dome, weather vane, clock, etc., etc. When the picture is finished to the satisfaction of the artist, it will be hung up in some conspicuous place in town for the inspection of the public.

## ELKS OPENED SPLENDID HOME LAST NIGHT

(By Frank DeSousa.)

Prescott, Feb. 20.—With the biggest crowd that has ever turned out to a paid performance in this city, the Elks' new opera house was thrown open to the public this evening.

The opening event was the appearance of Florence Roberts and Melbourne MacDowell in "Marta of the Lowlands," fully 1,200 people being in the opera house, though its seating capacity is 950.

Last Friday morning at 9 o'clock the advance sale of seats began and in two hours two-thirds of the house had been sold, the receipts in cash from the sale being \$1,000.

The third floor consists of two large rooms. These are to be used exclusively for lodge purposes. One of them will be reserved by the Elks for their use, and the other leased to local lodge societies that are without buildings of their own.

## THE NEW HOTEL BURKE.

### Opening of Prescott's Splendid New Hotel.

### Description of its Construction and Equip- ment. Its Value to Prescott. The Men Who Have Carried the Enter- prise to Completion.

Among the long list of splendid and magnificent buildings of various characters that have sprung up almost as if by magic in Prescott since that terrible conflagration on the 14th of July, 1900, there are none that stand out in greater prominence or beauty than the new Hotel Burke, which will be formally thrown open to guests this evening at 5:30 o'clock when the dining room doors will be thrown open and the first dinner served.

When the thousands of people who stood helpless on that memorable night and saw the hungry flames devour the old Hotel Burke, there were many a sad heart among the throng, for they saw being swept away one of the finest buildings in the city at that

being the ladies entrance to the dining room from the street. In the rotunda is situated the Postal telegraph company's office, a cigar stand and hotel office. From here also is manipulated all the lights of the house. A large indicator which is connected with every room by a double call system, is just back of the counter. 
