C. Approval of March 19 meeting minutes

D. Presentation on the Quad Cities High School Student Volunteer Fair by Jesus Gutierrez

Recently Stepping Stones has heard a lot from high school students needing service hours. This eventually created the Volunteer Fair. They ask that the board tell their friends and spread the word at their schools. The board expressed that it is difficult to find opportunities to serve so this will be helpful. Jesus will send that information to Tyler who will distribute to the group to share with their schools.

E. Naming of the Business Recognition Award

John Heiney presented the background of this award. The goal is to retain businesses, which is greatly beneficial to our community. This idea came from a city in another state that the mayor visited. There will be a submission form that businesses could nominate other businesses. It would go to a committee to determine the winner. The request of the board is that they help create a name for the business award. Paul recommended: "Hometown Best Business". Send ideas to Tyler. Nicklaus: what are the requirements?

John: it could be community service, giving back, or a milestone.

Ridley: are there different categories?

John: we're still working on that. We want to start simple and see how it goes with one category.

Ridley: which committee will choose who gets the award?

John: we're thinking of asking businesses we work closely with to be the review committee (peers).

Councilwoman Scholl: maybe one award could be celebratory and another could be more substantive.

John: we do celebratory with proclamations proclaiming a specific day for that business, but maybe we could do both.

F. Discuss Youth Event

The board is planning on an end-of-summer event. July 27th is the target date and they'd like a dance, yard games, and food trucks. They are looking into the DES building as a location. Once it gets dark they would move the event inside for a dance. They are planning on 5-10pm for the event. Age range is 13-19. Wristbands would be \$5 and you get 1 re-entry to eliminate some security issues.

Sponsorship will be tiered from \$250-\$750. Security would include 3 off-duty police officers for \$650.

They have a list of foodtrucks, have asked Outlaw Donuts, and Dutch Bros.

Nicklalus' mom could assist with design of the flyer because of her experience and job.

John can reach to Maranville's at the Mall about catering and event space for an alternative in the food court area. This will be the main plan now unless details change.

G. Presentation and Discussion on Regional Transportation by Sandy Stutey from Yavapai Regional Transit

Started as a senior transportation service in Chino Valley and was managed by the Town of Chino Valley. Sandy gave a background of public transit generally as well as here locally. She presented on various programs that are federally funded and locally matched. They have limitations on their routes because of their funding sources. It must be primarily "rural" and Prescott/Prescott Valley is considered a metro region.

Regional transit authorities are typically formed as a taxing entity to make it work and have the local match to get federal funding. This region does not have one. There is a planning process that CYMPO is engaged in now. There is public input if the board has interest in participating.

Ridley: how can we make this more accessible to youth and others who are seeking this service?

Sandy: routes can be established based on priority of what is valued most by the community. It is costly to established longer routes (time costs money and requires a higher local match). They plan to start a 2nd day to Prescott Valley in October 2019. They also want to extend time in Chino Valley beyond the 2:30pm current ending time.
